In Luke there are 44 references to the Kingdom, demonstrating that this is a powerful theme in the Gospel. As we review our understanding of God's approachability, His healing and reassuring presence, and His patience in changing our character and our thinking on our journey together, we then begin to understand Him as King.


He is not a **King** that lords it over His subjects, rather He provides a free space where He **cares** for us. First we must acknowledge our lostness without Him. We need to come to Him as a rebellious son returning home. This Kingdom is very different from any contentious political system we have known. Rather, it is a place where the **weak** have priority. The prodigal son, the naïve about money, the beggars, the ill, the widows and oppressed, the less than respectable, the children, the poor, the blind, and social outcasts—they are the ones who populate the Kingdom. It is not the perfect or the powerful or even the seemingly spiritual that are the guaranteed members of the Kingdom, it is the poor and weak. This should reassure us greatly that we can take shelter in this place of God's love.

In this section there are nine references to the Kingdom and they help give us Jesus' vision of the characteristics of His Kingdom. Jesus identifies John the Baptist's preaching as the turning point when the Kingdom was announced. Jesus tells us that the Kingdom is with us, but it is not something visible. He says that the Kingdom belongs to children. In fact, to be part of the Kingdom, we must have child-like faith. In contrast, the rich have a must harder time entering the Kingdom. Those who choose poverty or are willing to sacrifice their personal relationships will be rewarded for these choices to advance the Kingdom.

From early in Scripture God shows preference for the weak. He acts on behalf of the Israelite slaves, and liberates them. This Exodus creates a fundamental motif that is brought to a complete conclusion in Christ's death and resurrection. Christ acts on behalf of all who are weak and liberates us. And we, just as the Israelites, are given the opportunity to create an alternative society, one where God and His justice rule. In this the boundaries between rich and poor, weak and strong, and privileged and oppressed are blurred, evened out and eliminated. **Justice and equality** rule.

By extension we, too, become not only the weak who are cared for, we also become those who reach out to care for the weak. Rather than scrambling to become powerful so that we can help rule the world properly, we do as Christ did—we welcome the marginalized into our lives. This Kingdom of the broken becomes the Kingdom of the healing. We continue to hope for the day when it is the Kingdom of the whole.
